Prepare your images now...or just come to look and listen! It's a great way to learn from the judges.

Here are the rules...

**Image Size:** Longest dimension 4,000 pixels (20 inches at 200 ppi)

**Color Profile:** sRGB or Adobe 1998

**Named as:** Image Title.jpg (Sample: New York at Sunrise.jpg)

Must be exact name of Print

**Saved as:** JPG, quality 10

**Total File Size:** Not to exceed 3.5 MB

**3 Categories:** Portrait \* Weddings/Events \* Illustrative

**Max Entries:** 4 images

**HIGHLIGHTED!!** 

Do not use your own name in the file. Remove any keywords added to the EXIF data.

Make one folder with your name, drop all of your photos into that folder along with completed Microsoft Word 'Print Submission Form' from the website.

#### **DEADLINE: 12:00 NOON SHARP, MONDAY, MAY 15TH - NO EXCEPTIONS!!**

You must be a member and be present at the meeting for your images to be judged and/or critiqued.

## A Message from Our President

I am always amazed at how quickly technology improves and makes older equipment obsolete. This is especially true in the field of photography. In the film days, when you bought a really good camera body, you were pretty much set for life. Today, advances happen so fast that an SLR purchased six years ago cannot compete with the equivalent model made today.

While attending the Focus NY convention, I learned about a new light meter being developed that will be the world's first Bluetooth light meter as well as a color meter that will work wirelessly through your smartphone. The device, itself is small and light as it does not need to contain much in the way of electronics. It sends the information, wirelessly, to the app in your smartphone where all of the calculations are made. This meter can continually monitor the ambient lighting and color conditions; and when you are outdoors and a cloud rolls by, it will alert you to changes via the phone in your pocket. Initial distribution is scheduled for September and there is currently a Kickstarter campaign to get it going.

A few years ago, Lytro introduced a camera that allows the user to selectively adjust the focus after the capture. Using this camera, you can photograph in image and later adjust the aperture, use selective focus, tilt, focus spread, animation and add 3D. It's interesting and would be fun to play with, but not something that I'm hungering for right now. I am able to visualize and select my focus points in advance and have the knowledge to achieve the depth of field I am looking for.

What I would really love to see is a camera that can approach the dynamic range of what my eyes, in combination with my brain, can see. This past weekend, I was shooting in a synagogue with beautiful wood textures and equally beautiful windows near the ceiling that offered views of blue sky and greenery. To my eye, this was easy and beautiful to see, but my camera was unable to deal with the extreme dynamic range. Yes, I did take multiple exposures and created an HDR image, but I still think that what I saw was better than what I created. I'm looking forward to a camera that can effectively photograph that kind of scene in one shot!

# "The Seven DEADLY of Image Competition"

**Banding** - Strange or weird lines appear in places where they shouldn't be and weren't before, like in blue skies.

**Haloing** - bands of light (or dark) that follow edges in an object. Be especially careful to avoid these at the edge of a selection. Judges love to pick apart images when they spot haloing.

**Noise** - Unless it is an effect you are intentionally doing for your image try to reduce the noise in your image. Use Photoshop with one of the popular noise reduction plugins.

**Bright Spots** - The viewer's eye tends to go to the brightest spot of an image. If the brightest area is not the subject of your image, consider toning it down to draw your eye to the main subject (tip - turn the image upside down and see where your eye goes first - then make your change)

**Stroke** - The stroke around an image should enhance your presentation, not draw the judge's eye away. pay close attention to the width, saturation and brightness of it. The stroke should be elegant and understated and almost always be created from a color found in the composition.

**Cloning / Tracking** - Do a good job and the judges will reward you. Do a bad job and they will see it.

**Over Sharpening** - Sometimes less is more. Try putting your sharpening on a separate layer and while viewing your image at 100%, then dial down the opacity some.





#### USING THE HISTORY BRUSH IN PHOTOSHOP



#### The Better Alternative to Dodge & Burn

Use the History Brush to lighten or darken areas of your image without changing the color as Dodge and Burn will do. Paint using the History

Brush in 'Screen' Mode to lighten and 'Multiply' to darken from the History Brush Panel. This will only work providing you have **not** modified the size of the image.
